How to Recognize an Overdose

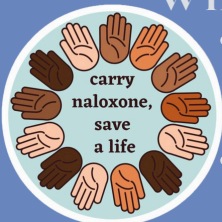
- Falling asleep or losing consciousness
- Doesn't respond to stimuli like shouting, a pinch, or sternum rub
- Slow, weak, or no breathing
- Choking or gurgling sounds
- Limp body
- Cold or clammy skin
- Discolored skin (especially on lips and nails)

What To Do If Someone Has Overdosed

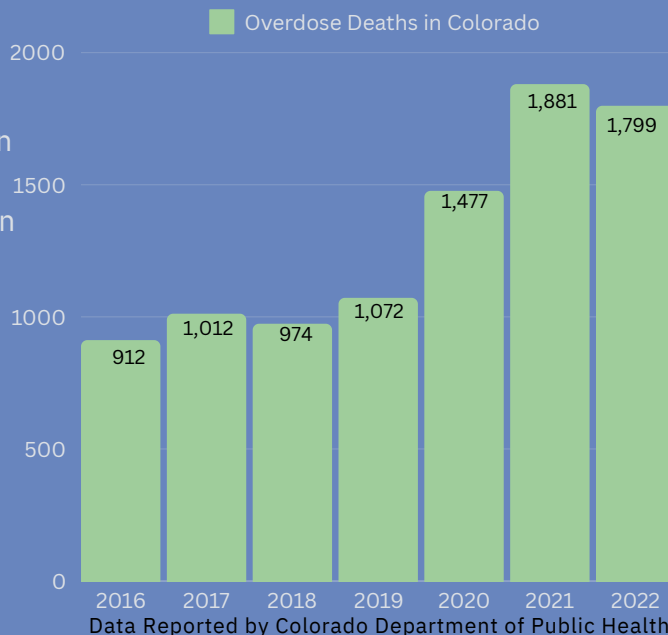
-  Immediately call 911
-  Administer Narcan (if applicable)
-  Lay person on side to prevent choking
-  Keep person awake and breathing
-  Stay with person until 911 arrives

You are protected under the Good Samaritan Law in Colorado

What is Narcan?



- Narcan, often referred to as Naloxone, is a nasal spray medication that can reverse an opioid overdose.
- You can save a life by carrying Narcan



Prevention Tips

- Find a Local Harm Reduction Site
- Avoid Mixing Drugs and Alcohol
- If Using Alone: Call the Never Use Alone Lifeline: 877-696-1996
- Use Fentanyl Test Strips
